
## **Inscribed Magical Artefacts - Overview**

This is an overview of the five major groups of inscribed ancient magical artefacts from the archaeological record dating between the 2<sup>nd</sup> century B.C. and the 7<sup>th</sup> century A.D. The numbers are based on my research and database but it needs to be kept in mind that these can only be estimations since it can be difficult - and in many cases impossible - to classify an inscription clearly as magical in contrast to, for example, as a prayer.
